

AMENDMENT 1 – FY26 Positive Pathways for Alaska Recovery: Expanding Harm Reduction

The solicitation is amended as follows to accurately reflect the map in Attachment 1:

1) Under Section 1.05 Target Population, Service Areas and Communities

- **Region 1: Anchorage Municipality**
- **Region 2: Fairbanks North Star Borough**
- **Region 3: Northern and Interior Region**
- **Region 4: Kenai Peninsula Borough**
- **Region 5: Mat-Su Borough**
- **Region 6: Western Region**
- **Region 7: Northern Southeast Region**
- **Region 8: Southern Southeast Region**
- **Region 9: Gulf Coast/Aleutian Region**

Applicants may propose to provide services in more than one Region.

The solicitation is also amended to reflect the following:

- 2) Under Section 1.06 Program Funding**, under *Note*, directly after the sentence: ‘However, these incentive amounts may be subject to change based on updated funding or policy guidance.’ is added:

If the offeror pursues the option to use funding for substance use disorder treatment, including contingency management and/or medication for addiction treatment, they must comply with State Opioid Response Government Performance and Results Act (GPRA) requirements as set by SAMHSA, ensuring accurate and timely submission of all required data. The following is more about GPRA:

The Government Performance and Results Act (GPRA) is a federal requirement that supports performance measurement for programs funded by the SAMHSA. Individuals receiving substance use disorder services must complete GPRA-compliant interviews at three standardized intervals: intake, six-month follow-up, and discharge. These structured interviews gather information across multiple domains, including substance use, mental and physical health, housing stability, employment, and criminal justice involvement. The awardee(s) must ensure timely, accurate, and confidential administration of the GPRA interviews as well as appropriate engagement strategies to support follow-up completion rates (see Section 1.06). GPRA interviews may be conducted in person, by phone, or in coordination with a separate state contractor or agency. The awardee(s) must abide by federal and state reporting guidelines which may change at any time.
